Transition Town Wellington

Transition Town Wellington were over the moon to get the unexpected news that we had been awarded the first-ever RHS award for sustainable gardening this year. It was an incredible morale booster for this team of dedicated volunteers who have spent the last decade or more working steadily to transform 11 green spaces in and around this small town on the Somerset/Devon border.

Britain in Bloom's southwest judge, Terry Porter said, "I was amazed at how much Wellington had moved on since I last visited. [There's been] a vast improvement and the strength of the community groups was impressive."

Sarah Galvin, RHS Head of National Community Programmes, says the recently launched RHS community awards highlight "groups that put environmental stewardship, climate awareness and wildlife-friendly practices at the heart of their work."

Wellington's five Britain in Bloom certificates, the CPRE plaque, the RHS trophy and the handsome London & Manchester cup will be showcased in the council's offices, because this year's wins shine a light not only on TTW but a host of others: the council's own dedicated open spaces team and fantastic community groups, like

the Basins Volunteers and the Swains Lane Nature Reserve group. TTW dovetails with their activities, and the whole town has benefitted as a result—with an incredible 65.5-acre green corridor established in 2023, including an organic community farm, over 3000 trees planted, and TTW's own 'jewel in the crown': Fox's Field forest garden.

Five years ago, this site was just a rough grassy field, situated next to the historic woollen mill at Tonedale on the edge of Wellington. Now families and kids walk around it, harvesting fruit, veg and herbs from the beautiful 2-acre forest garden.

Helen Gillingham leads the community gardening team, a group with food at its heart and fire in its belly – or is that the other way round? “Everyone needs to eat, and we all love sharing food, but so many people these days have no idea how to grow their own, or even where the food that we buy in the shops comes from.” The forest garden is a superb example of how growing food for humans can simultaneously feed wildlife, boost biodiversity, improve soil health, mitigate for floods. “And it’s also just so beautiful,” she says: and the judges agree.

Good for the soul, good for soil. The team have followed principles of permaculture wherever possible – reusing and recycling materials, composting on site, and using clearance mulches to suppress grass and weeds which helps preserve the soil structure and enhance the microbiome.

In June 2025, the team hosted 12 local ecologists and conservationists who led a bioblitz on the field. The results showed an incredible surge in species since the forest garden was planted, with nearly 200 species recorded in the course of 24 hours, compared with just 54 species in 2023.

The key to success, TTW firmly believes, is in diversity: diversity in species, diversity in people, a diversity of skills, ages, interests and abilities. TTW is part of a global network of small community groups working at a local level to reduce carbon emissions and tackle the climate and ecological crises. This year’s award has set us on a course for even bigger and better things in the future, with the group aiming to become a formally registered charity in 2026.

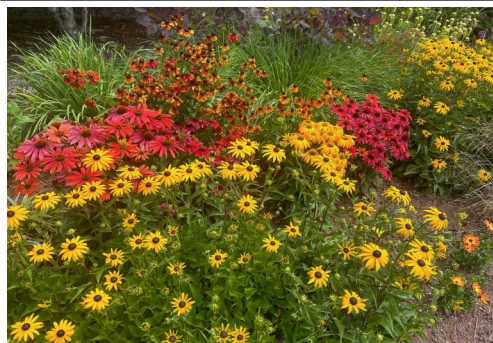

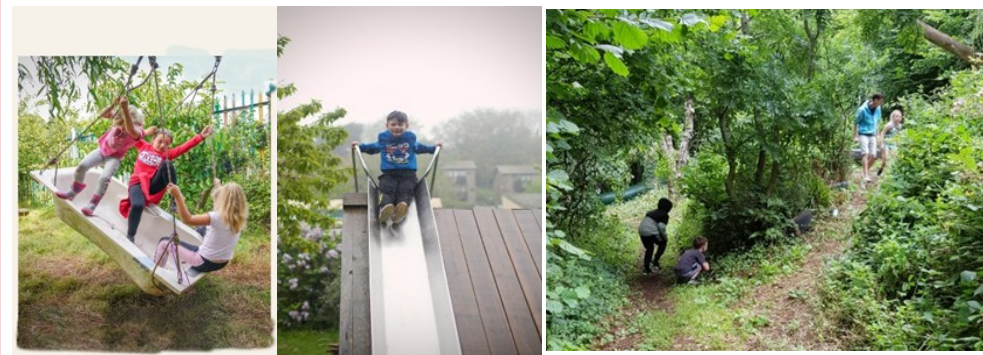

Indigos Play and Ecology Centre, Brixham

This is a site that has been running as a free woodland play area supported by the charity, Play Torbay for over 17 years. Some of the buildings and planting that has happened, has certainly helped to make it a very magical place!

There is a large level playing field with goal posts, a trim trail and wooden play structures. There is a play area with a sand pit, slide, craft tables and a bath swing.



Over the past few years there has been some major clearance and the building of the Ryder Cabin, which is warm and very well-made, with tables, chairs, and mains services.

Also installed is the Appleton polytunnel to provide a large adaptable sheltered space for different community events, like birthday parties.



There are regular play opportunities for children after school and in the holidays. There is also a weekly Forest School session for children who are home educated.

For some of these families, especially those with children with additional needs, Forest School is a lifeline. Children of all ages up to 15 years attend and enjoy a whole range of bushcraft skills, including lighting individual fires using fire steels, whittling wooden mushrooms, bug hunting, leaf painting and playing games with friends.



This is currently a free opportunity for the children, and the parents and carers attending are dedicated to ensuring its longevity. This in turn has led to the introduction of the peer home- education research project with Exeter and Plymouth universities looking at the issues with families and examining whether there could be more appropriate learning approaches for some children.

Forest School families also actively support fund-raising initiatives. As part of the commitment to sustainable change there is a collaborative partnership with the local Heritage project, ‘Life on the Edge’ which is helping to restore endangered insects. ASRUS is another weekly club at Indigos. It is for families with children with autism who this year successfully planted and grew special peas for rare bees which they transplanted on an ‘edge in Brixham’ where they continue to thrive.



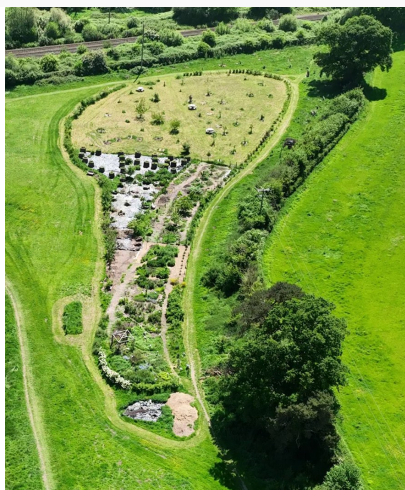
Transition Town Wellington WINS top Sustainability Award in the country!

At the RHS Britain in Bloom national finals on Friday 31 October, we were thrilled, delighted and stunned to hear that TTW has won the 2025 RHS Community Award for Sustainable Gardening.

There were five finalists for this new award: St Ives in Bloom (Cambridgeshire), Flourishing Forth (Scotland), Friends of Upminster Windmill Gardening Group (London), Holt Community Gardeners (Wales) and Transition Town Wellington (South West).

Wellington's Mayor, Janet Lloyd, and Darren Hill, Wellington Town Council's Open Spaces Manager accepted the Sustainable Gardening Award on behalf of TTW at the award ceremony in Brighton. Jon Wheatley, the chair of South West Britain in Bloom, said, ***"You are fantastic! This is the top sustainability award in the country – Wellington can be really proud."***

'Our Beautiful Countryside'



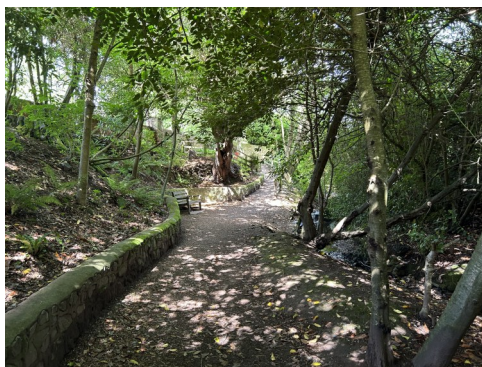

2025 CPRE Environmental Awards

CPRE in the South West is proud to have partnered with RHS SW In Bloom again this year to sponsor the Environmental Award.

Through our award, we hope to celebrate new projects with sustainability and community involvement at their heart.

The entries this year were very varied, but they all demonstrated just how much people treasure their local green spaces. Most importantly, they showed just how people are prepared to get stuck in to keep them special! Chairs of each local CPRE charity in our SW group voted on the shortlist provided by RHS judges and our first second and third choices were as follows:



Winner: Newton St Cyres Arboretum, Devon

Over 135 volunteers donate £10 a year and get directly involved in looking after this special place. The arboretum is used for all kinds of events from picnics to yoga to outdoor theatre. New habitats are being created, and nest boxes are regularly installed.

Second place: Writhlington Community Allotments, Radstock, BANES

We were impressed by an ingenious project to collect rainwater from a neighbour's pigeon loft and pump it to tanks around the allotment site, using solar power. Previously the allotments had no mains water, which is clearly very challenging with our increasingly dry summers. The system is totally off grid and sustainable. There is even a communal polytunnel allowing allotment holders to grow tender vegetables



CPRE Environmental Award

Third place: Transition Town Wellington, Foxes Field, Wellington, Somerset



Foxes field is a large site, maintained by up to 50 volunteers, with some trees, areas for planting and growing produce, opportunities for foraging and a picnic area. There are information boards welcoming people to the field, and they have even produced a recipe book!

2026: CPRE's centenary

CPRE, the Campaign to Protect Rural England, has been speaking up for our countryside for almost one hundred years. Our charity will be 100 years old in 2026, and we are proud of our history and achievements. Did you know

- i that it was CPRE that campaigned for the establishment of a national planning system to curtail urban sprawl?
- ii that it was CPRE that demanded better access to our countryside after two world wars, and we fought for the establishment of our national parks and national landscapes?
- iii that we have a locally based charity in each county as well as the national CPRE charity? This means we can influence government as well as being in touch with our local communities. Please consider becoming a member of your Local CPRE.

CPRE's centenary year will involve lots of celebrations, lots of forward-looking projects all over the country, plus a little bit of nostalgia, of course!

We hope our Environmental Awards with RHS SW in Bloom will be bigger and better than ever in 2026 so do make sure your community group gets their entry in. Look out also for exciting news about a new CPRE garden at the 2026 Chelsea Flower Show.

Reclaiming Our Lanes: Our Community Transformation

Take a walk around the **lanes surrounding Enfield Road in Babbacombe, Torquay** and you will notice a huge change. Once unloved, overgrown and strewn with litter, they have been completely transformed into valued community spaces, abundant with plants and wildlife.

We are a group of local residents, known as the **Laners**, who have worked together over the last year to **Reclaim Our Lanes (ROL)**. The idea was simple: to clean up our lanes, sow wildflower seeds and plants, encourage more pollinating insects and wildlife, and create tranquil



community spaces and walkways for us all to enjoy.

A Year of Hard Work

In **August 2024**, we began the tough job of breathing new life into the four lanes, by clearing countless bags of rubbish, builders' rubble and green waste. **SWISCo** were instrumental in assisting us with waste removal and getting the project off the ground and our local Community Partnership kindly donated funding for

some t-shirts and equipment.

Our transformation involved several key steps:

- 1 **Access:** Muddy paths were transformed into usable, fragrant walkways 'thanks to the donation and delivery of wood chippings by **Coombeshead Tree Care**.
- 2 **Planting:** Neighbours and friends donated over **200 plants**, allowing us to plant dozens of bulbs, perennials, and wildflower seeds.
- 3 **Wildlife:** We built 'bug hotels', created a small pond, and set up wildlife watering points.



Our motto is simple: **Recycle, reuse, repurpose!** Flower bed borders have been created using salvaged bricks and roof tiles. Redundant garage doors and gates have been decorated with murals, and discarded items upcycled and put to good use.

By **August 2025**, the fruits of our labour were clear for all to see - accessible, clean, green lanes, flowers in full bloom buzzing with bees and insects, hand-made signs providing educational information and points of interest to stop, look and wonder.

Local residents and dog walkers cannot believe the changes we've made in such a short space of time, and we were surprised and proud to be awarded a **'Level 3 – Advancing'** certificate for the **'It's Your Neighbourhood'** category in this year's **SWIB!**

More Than Just Gardening

For us, **ROL** is about building a stronger local community, where people and nature can connect and thrive. We come together for just a couple of hours on a Saturday morning (though some go over and above - no names!). In that time, we've formed wonderful friendships and achieved remarkable things ... and all done with love and laughter. It's a joy to be part of!

From October 2025 to 2026, the charity is also celebrating 50 years of heritage seed conservation at its Heritage Seed Library with a unique seed relay across the UK. Precious heritage seeds will be shared, sown, and saved by communities and projects to highlight the vital role the library plays in supporting food security and biodiversity.

Kate Eastment, Project Coordinator at Garden Organic, says:

“People volunteer with us for many reasons. Some are passionate about organic growing, while others want to give back to their community and develop new skills.”

North Somerset Master Composters

In North Somerset, a team of local volunteers are helping people discover how simple and rewarding composting can be. Composting is one of the easiest ways we can all make a difference — restoring health to our soils, cutting waste and energy use, and saving money at home. Through the **North Somerset Master Composter programme**, volunteers receive training and ongoing support from **Garden Organic**, working in partnership with **North Somerset Council**.

Once trained, they share their knowledge across the community — at schools, allotments, gardening clubs, markets, and local events such as the Nailsea Eco Fair, Eat Weston Festival, and Sustainable Backwell's Walking Carnival. This year alone, Master Composters have delivered hands-on workshops to hundreds of children and young people, helping them turn kitchen scraps and garden clippings into nutrient-rich compost. Volunteers tailor their talks and demonstrations to suit any audience — from beginners curious about getting started to experienced gardeners keen to learn new techniques. Workshops and advice sessions cover all the essentials, from balancing “green” and “brown” materials to preventing pests, showing that composting is practical, simple, and accessible for everyone.



Sallie, a North Somerset Master Composter, adds:

“One of my favourite moments was when my son realised composting was as easy as making a heap. He was amazed to think he was creating his own earth!”

Together, these compost champions are helping North Somerset grow a more sustainable future — one heap at a time.

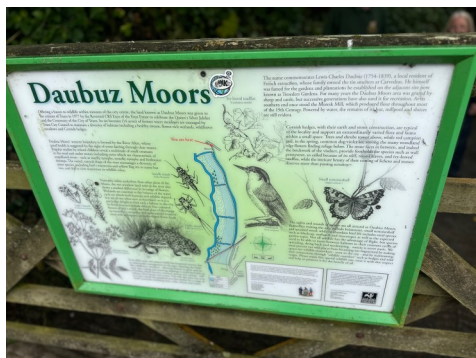
