Royal Marines Charity, a charity dedicated to providing support to all Royal Marines and their families, will be using Stanley's Garden to support Royal Marine and other veterans.



Weston College's Weston Bay is a residential training centre for students on the autism spectrum and run weekly sessions at Stanley's Garden.

Bountiful Bulbs

Bulbs, a group of plants which fill me with glee, sparked initially by my love of daffodils which has never left me. Whether a bulb, corm, rhizome or tuber, they are all essentially underground storage organs which produce a yearly display upon which many gardeners come to rely.

As a member of the RHS Bulb Committee I have been thrilled to be involved in an RHS Trial of Early Flowering Tulips, their bright reds and yellows cheering any dreary spring day. It has been an honour to share the Forum with horticultural stalwarts Anna Pavord (author of the best selling 'The Tulip' and 'Bulb') and Fergus Garret of Great Dixter fame. Some cultivars have been suggested for AGMs (Award of Garden Merit), while others have had their AGMs re-confirmed. I urge anyone to pay a visit to

the trial beds at RHS Wisley – where you will find a plethora of different plants rubbing shoulders with each other, competing for approval.

While judging for South West in Bloom this summer, I was thrilled to be presented with plenty of bulbous beauty from outstanding orange Crocosmia to blissful blue Agapanthus (not a true bulb but often included in summer bulb lists due to its rhizome like stems).

Late summer bulbs at their best, taking over from the purples and whites of alliums which have become so fashionable in garden design in the past few decades. I was lucky enough to visit the allium fields of W S Warmenhoven in The Netherlands a few years back, a breath-taking site, as were the acres of Iris at Cayeux in France. How glorious horticulture is!





Tulip mania is well documented, with bulbs exchanging hands for the same price as houses back in 17th century Holland. (A craze which also applied to Hyacinth bulbs in times gone by).

Tulips take some beating when formally planted en-masse as demonstrated at Keukenhof in The Netherlands, however there is also a magical beauty when dotted in a meadow setting as in Dunsborough Park in Surrey, where they take the bulbs from the formal borders each year and scatter them to form a patchwork tapestry for years to come.

As I mentioned, daffodils are my true love, and with over 25,000 different cultivars and 13 different divisions, there is truly a daffodil for all. I am lucky to have one named after me by talented breeder and daffodil expert, Brian Duncan – recent recipient of the Victoria Medal of Honour. I adore some of the heritage varieties, 'White Lady' is elegant and perfumed, whilst 'Mary Copeland' is a delicate double with a fresh fragrance and perfectly partnered with her sister 'Irene Copeland'. I visited the fields of Taylors Bulbs in Lincolnshire this spring to film with Mary Berry, where she and I were mesmerized by the glorious fields of gold.

Golden Tears

Snowdrops can't go unmentioned, as these are surely one of the most seriously followed bulbs, with gazillions of galanthophiles up and down the country watching their every move.

In 2021 a new record price for the sale of a single snowdrop has been achieved - £1,850 for 'Golden Tears', proving that their popularity is as strong as ever.

They are also as clever as they are beautiful, with research indicating that they have thermal properties, able to heat the ground

above – look out for bare patches of grass around snowdrop clumps in the snow this winter!

So while we await the first bulbs of the new year, hopefully you'll surround yourself with a Hippeastrum or two, a pot of Paperwhite and a selection of indoor hyacinths to whet your appetite for what's ahead as we celebrate the sensational perennial cycle of our much loved bulbs.

Mike Nelhams - Ideas from Tresco

A modest choice of plants that give the "Tender touch" in your garden but can resist some occasional colder weather.



Banksia integrifolia

A member of the Proteaceae family from Australia . It is an evergreen and once to a modest maturity after 4/5 years will produce yellow candle like flowers all year round. It has quite a tolerance to cold weather and will take a frost or two without damage. In coastal areas it will not mind being in a windy spot and will grow eventually to be up to ten metres tall.

Coleonema album

If I had to pick one plant that has a wide ranging appeal it would be the South African confetti bush...Coleonema.

If rubbed it has wonderfully fragrant foliage that produces copious amounts of little white flowers that sit on top of the plant in a gentle haze for many weeks across the seasons.

Very amenable to being clipped into shape it is long lasting and well worth a place in any garden.



Agave ferox

If you are looking for something architectural this is the plant for you. Known as the century plant, originating in Mexico but now widespread it will flower only once in

its life but upon flowering present a towering flower spike of anything up to and above fifteen foot high.

Can be grown on poor and rocky soils, giving any garden a focal point over many years.

This plant however bites....its ferocious marginal teeth and terminal leaf spikes ready to catch out any unsuspecting gardener passing nearby.





Abutilon vitifolium

Easily grown from seed, this plants appearance belies how tough it really is. coming from Chile it has all the look of something that should sit in a warm glasshouse but in reality grows very comfortably outside.

From seed a plant is mature within three years producing elegant delicate looking foliage with large white (or sometimes blue) paper like flowers across the bush. Growing to around three of four metres high it will grace the back of a border and although not long lived, it's worth the effort.

Olearia x Scilloniensis

This plant occurred as a natural hybrid in the Abbey Garden as a result of Olirata x Ophlogopappa happily running into each other.

Producing a small white flower in early spring from March onwards it is now generally found in many nurseries across the country and makes a fine long term addition to any garden. Growing up to six foot high it can be regularly pruned to keep a bushy and full flowering appearance for many years.



.Glendale completes new road scheme in Plymouth



Glendale have been working on the Forder Valley Interchange improvement project for the last 2 years, initially carrying out site clearance, followed by the installation of nearly 1km of dry stone walling and this planting season will see nearly 30,000 trees and shrubs planted to soften this new gateway into Plymouth.

In a change to the norm, Sedum was used for verges, instead of the traditional grass lawns. Sedum can

withstand drought, for example in very hot summers. Sedum is easy to maintain and requires little water and nutrients and is very resilient to diseases and insects pests.

With climate change and the need to evolve our traditional views on public open spaces, Sedum has great adaptability under extreme weather conditions.

Be Sustainable Limited then provided gap analysis and verification to ensure our assumptions and calculations were accurate. These GHG emissions have then been offset through the procurement of PAS 2060 approved carbon credits via the United Nations carbon offset platform.

Glendale will continue to measure and offset its GHG emissions on an annual basis to remain carbon neutral, as well as setting and measuring GHG reduction targets inline with PAS 2060. This constitutes Glendale's first step to achieving net zero for the business as we adopt new technologies and push forward with energy saving initiatives.

Las Posas (The Pool)

After leaving the RHS Council after 10 years service, I was a little concerned just what to do!

Then I was contacted by the Royal Botanical Gardens Kew to take part in their Autumn 22 Mexican celebration feature.

Our brief was to re create a feature that we had exhibited at Chelsea in 2015 MX15. The feature was to create Las Posas (the pools), a surrealistic garden in Xlita, Mexico, designed by Edward James.





The main feature on entering this garden is a moongate, which we built to scale and some wonderful pillars and surreal snakes.

Planting included an eclectic mixture of plants, some obtained from Holland, but many grown at Chew Magna to represent the extensive flora and Mexican culture.



Highlight of course were the many species Dahlias that we were able to grow at Chew and introduce into the feature.

We also built an arch which linked our exhibit to that of world famous designer Betabie Romero and included celebrating "Day of the Dead Masks" and fruit from Mexico.

I also created some plantings reflective of the gardening culture of Mexico where they grow vast quantities of food and flowers.



Kew were very happy with the outcome as were my team who initially took convincing that it would be worthwhile. Thanks to all involved.

What does 2022 show us about the future of our gardens in a world of climatic uncertainty? By Saul Walker

As I pen this article, overnight temperatures are still around 15C, in the middle of November, highlighting that 2022 will be a year where the weather has been a constant source of fascination, heartbreak and a sign of change. We are all aware of the ongoing and future consequences of our species' impact on the world's climate, and, with political will, the world's nations will band together to figure how we soften the ongoing problems that we must now confront. We do, however, have to face that the summer we've just experienced may become the norm, bookended by periods of thunderous rainfall and heavy storms like those we faced in March, and as gardeners we aren't immune to it all. So, what has this summer showed us about our gardens and natural environment.


Well firstly, it has shown me that no amount of irrigation can see the garden through almost three months of drought. At Stonelands, which at 16 acres is a large area to try to maintain, but even in my smaller garden at home, constant watering may cover small periods of drought but after three months water supplies both mains and private were struggling to cope with the magnitude of the need.

At first I was only watering those newly planted specimens or plant's that I knew

were very susceptible to extended scarcity of water – but into the third month much of the garden was parched and keeping up was hopeless, so many plants had to fend for themselves. In the end my thoughts fell to observing which plants fared better than others and a mental note for future plantings. *Hydrangea*, *Astrantia* and *Rhododendron* struggled to live through the lack of water, while *Acer*, *Camelia*, Apple trees and *Eryngium* barely blinked in the heat, many plants fairing better than others.

By observing the winners and losers in the fight against the heat and lack of moisture, it shows that though we may lose some of our cherished palette of plant species and cultivars, there are plants that stay strong and will continue to offer us good garden worthy plantings. One of the unknowns, however, is how long-term consequences to a continued change in our usual seasonally stable weather patterns might effect permanent plantings especially our trees and shrubs, I for one am interested to see how Spring blossom and subsequent new growth might have been altered due to this year.

And beyond the plants, do we now have the ability to go on using precious resources to continue bringing our cultivated spaces to life. Water, being the most pertinent considering the summer, but also our use of composts, fertilisers and machinery all come with an environmental toll and we must start considering alternative ways of growing, storing and harnessing natural solutions for our growing needs. We are lucky in that many of answers are already in our own practice of gardening - trees provide shade from heat, slow down water run off allowing our gardens and green spaces to act as sponges instead of water pouring down into the sewers, clever planting of shrubs can provide cover for more delicate herbaceous plants, perennial meadows show more resilience to drought than highly cultivated lawns – the tools and traditions already exist for us to keep bringing natural spaces into our urban environments even in the continued face of an altering climate.

Though we need a period of introspection into how this human-made effect on our climatic system could have been avoided and, with hope, mitigated for the future. It is worth noting that humans are incredibly adaptable, being part of the natural world as we are, we must learn to evolve as our gardens and civic spaces must as well. I for one am excited to see how the garden is changing in the UK with the evolution we are now going through. I hope that by seeing the work that you all do in your cities, towns and villages, at schools, prisons and pubs as it evolves over the next decade will be exciting and thought provoking as we go forward into this new climatic age.


