#### Considerations prior to planting

Site preparation\_- Must be free from perennial weeds and add organic matter as it your last chance

Post planting - water if necessary & mulch with 5cm bark / wood chip

#### Plant selection

Must be long lived and not require staking or dead heading. Select those showing tolerance or resistance to pests and disease e.g. Avoid Michaelmas Daisies that are prone to mildew and use the New England Asters or *Aster x frikartii* instead. Plants should not require regular lifting and splitting.

#### Post planting

Mulch to a minimum depth of 5cms with bark chip to prevent weed seed germination and retain moisture. Water to establish plants if necessary.

Examples of plants found to be long lived (20-25 years) suitable for woodland. Astilbe chinensis, Vinca minor, Epimedium, Ferns, Symphytum, Helleborus

Examples of plants found to be long lived (20-25 years) suitable for woodland edge conditions (light shade)

Geranium macrorrhizum, Hemerocallis, Pulmonaria, Ligularia, Brunnera, Lamium orvala Examples of plants found to be long lived (20-25 years) suitable for open ground conditions (sunny)

Erica carnea, Phlomis russeliana, paeonia, Persicaria amplexicaulis and P. affine, Bergenia, Aconitum, Hemerocallis, Miscanthus, Anemone x hybrida Cvs

#### What to grasses have to offer?

<u>Aesthetic qualities of</u> – light reflection (*Stipa gigantea*), many have a strong vertical line (*Calamagrostis x acutifolia* 'Karl Foerster') and almost constant movement (*Molinia* 'Transparent')

<u>Foliage effects</u> – colour, autumn tints & winter interest but little variation in form.

Sesleria autumnalis (lime green) *Calamagrostis x acutiflora* 'Overdam' (variegated), *Miscanthus sinensis* 'China' (autumn tints)

<u>Flower interest</u> – not very varied form but valuable winter effect. LImited muted colour palette but they appear to absorb colour from adjacent colourful perennials.

#### What do perennials have to offer?

<u>Flower interest</u> – intense colour, considerable variation in inflorescence form (spikes, buttons, curtains, daisies, plumes), some winter interest from seedheads

<u>Foliage effects</u> – plenty of choice of colour & form. Good autumnal tints but limited winter interest except for evergreen perennials such as *Bergenia* and hellebores

#### Plant combinations

A combination of BOLD, FEATHERY and SPIKY always makes for a pleasing combination e.g. *Iris sibirica* (spiky foliage), *Astilbe* (feathery foliage and flowers) and *Hosta* (bold foliage)

#### Using grasses and perennials

Grasses on their own lack variety of form and look boring- they come to life when combined with the more intense flower colour of perennials. Adding autumn foliage shrubs and coloured stems will enhance late autumn & winter interest e.g. Cornus sanguinea 'Midwinter Fire'

#### **Sustainable Planting by Mary Payne MBE**

This is a brief summary of the presentation gave by Mary at the South West in Bloom Spring Seminar.

#### Comparison of planting styles

#### Seasonal Bedding

Advantages - instant colour over a long season and relatively low plant costs Disadvantages - high density planting takes time, twice yearly change of plants. Occasional weeds very obvious.

#### Permanent planting of grasses and perennials

Advantages – One off planting at a reduced density means less labour input. Lower carbon footprint regarding plant production costs. Seed heads are good for wildlife. Less prone to vandalism.

Disadvantages - More training required and slower to establish

#### **Shrubs**

*Advantages* – acceptable for roadside banks. Suitable for "moronic" pruning. Good cover for wildlife depending on species used

Disadvantages – Little variation in form. Lack of colour over prolonged season.

#### Shrubs ground cover

Advantages - More contrast in texture. Less prone to moronic pruning Disadvantages - Low ground cover prone to weed invasion

#### Viridor (Revive Soil Conditioner)

#### **School Gardening Project**



Bridgwater school uses Viridor competition prize for new greenhouse St Joseph's School in Bridgwater, who came first in Viridor's Dig It, Grow It, Cook It, Eat It competition, have used their prize of £200 garden centre vouchers to buy a new greenhouse.

The Bridgwater primary school came joint first with Ladymead Community School in Taunton, who started a large scale allotment space. They will be using their vouchers towards materials to further develop and improve their allotment.



Fifty schools in Somerset entered Viridor's competition, which is supported by Somerset Waste Action Programme, to find the most imaginative ideas for creating a vegetable patch in their school and keeping diaries to record their progress. Each school received one tonne of Viridor's Revive Compost Conditioner and six packets of seasonal vegetable seeds to help them on their way.

Rupert Farthing from Somerset

Waste Action Programme, said: The Dig It, Grow It, Cook It, Eat It competition is all about young people understanding and appreciating the full food cycle and that leftovers from the garden and kitchen are not just rubbish, but could be the beginnings of good, rich compost."

Jane Bazire, Classroom Assistant at St Joseph's, said: "Pupils from Year Three filled a beautiful scrapbook with lots of pictures of the vegetables they grew and created an exciting menu that the youngsters helped to cook and eat. "They were so excited about winning the competition and getting a brand new greenhouse to help them grow even more vegetables."

Kevin Bishop, Viridor's Regional Recycling Manager, said: "Helping children grow their own vegetables in compost made from 100 per cent natural organic materials is a great example of the perfect recycling loop.

"We've taken this idea further with our Revive soil conditioner by helping some incredible gardening projects in the local community and encouraging schoolchildren to become inspired gardeners."

#### Kim Parish Vice Chairman South West in Bloom

My passion for horticulture started slightly later in life and at the age of 25 I followed my dreams, giving up a career in civil engineering and enrolling on a 3 year BSc landscape & garden design course at Writtle College in Essex. I then took a local authority based job in Cornwall working as a Client Officer, monitoring contract compliance, the day-to-day management of the parks & open spaces, designing over 200 unique bedding schemes, implementing change with the design & development of new landscaping schemes.



My role developed into the Horticultural Development Officer. I was responsible for managing the production of ¼ million bedding plants, improving service standards, managing staff, developing the commercial potential of the service with particular emphasis on sponsorship & generating income opportunities for the nursery and leading with publicity. It was here that I first got involved with in bloom with supporting the Newquay group.

In 2002 I was lucky enough to be able to design and oversee the implementation of two show gardens at the celebration of Cornish gardens and Royal Cornwall Flower Tent and was awarded Silver and Silver Gilt. I continued to work with local towns and support them in their in bloom entries. In 2006 the service was privatised and my role again developed taking the lead in landscape & floral developments, assessing & developing new schemes, securing funding & sponsorship whilst engaging communities to ensure they are fit for purpose & meet local needs, continuing to support 'In Bloom' initiatives, actively involving local communities & encouraging a programme of activities which use the parks as a resource and utilising horticulture to encourage adults to return to work from prolonged periods of sickness and to give children struggling with the education system experience to take into employment. During this time I helped design & implement an eco-friendly garden at the LGA Conference and we were awarded Best in Show.

I have been a regional SW in Bloom judge since 2006 and it is a privilege to meet so many enthusiastic and hard working groups making a real change to the areas they live and work in. I am passionate about the In Bloom competition and how it is a benefit to so many people. Communities hold the future to the improvement of our villages, towns & cities and during my time as a judge I have helped drive the competition forward through it's your neighbourhood and the development of the competition.

From a personal view I am a Mum of a lively 7 year old and enjoy when I get the opportunity helping at my Sons school, assisting with gardening club and fund raising thought the PTA. I like to spend as much family time as possible but when I get free time I am a keen runner and am currently developing my own new garden.
