Allotment holders are people of habit, they like to jump in their car or bike and get to the site within a short space of time. Whatever you do enjoy your gardening and get your seed orders in early as many varieties sell out.



Halloween will have passed by the time you read this article. A lot of us think that the whole event has got out of control which was once simply carving out a Swede or a Turnip and putting a candle in it.

Ways to create environmentally friendly floral displays


The garden was again designed by Jon, and was intended to feature all the aspects of Bloom,


The garden was honoured to be selected for a visit by King Charles III as pert of the Royal tour. He spent some time at the stand and showed a great interest in the vegetables.

We had an area where we featured Knoll Grasses species with allium and bio diverse wild flowers as part of Neil Lucas's book launch.

Going on to do his degree in Amenity Horticulture at the Royal Botanic Garden, Edinburgh. Then went on to spend time working abroad both in Cameroon, at the Limbe Botanic Garden and a five-year stint in Japan, where he also completed a master's degree in Horticultural therapy. Returning home to work at Kew Royal Botanic Garden and then three years as head gardener at Westminster Abbey.

Chris's television career began with the BBC 2 series the Plantsman. Which was followed on by regular appearances on This Morning, BBC breakfast and UK style television Series included Garden Rivals and Digging for Victory.

He served nine years as the Blue Peter gardener which has led him to work closely with schools and children. He has been active in the Royal Horticultural Society's Campaign for school gardening and the Horticultural Trades Association Plant for life campaign, as well as working with charities such as School food Matters and Trees for Cities. Chris was awarded the Prince Phillip City and guild medal for contribution to Horticulture in 2008. In recent years Chris presented the science documentary on BBC4 'The wonder of Weeds' and BBC 3's young gardener of the year.

Chris has run his own business for the past two decades and works closely with Garden Organic as Head of Horticulture. He was recently awarded fellowship of the City & Guilds Institute, voted in the Horticultural Week in the top 50 Gardening influencers and, along with Garden Organic won podcast of the year at the Garden Media Guild Awards.

He was elected to the Council of the RHS in 2012 where he served as Trustee for 10 years, chairing a number of Committees, always with a focus on community gardening.


In February 2022 he was appointed Chairman of the Federation of Britain in Bloom.


Pete Welsh

Book - Cultivated Therapeutic Landscapes, Gardening for Prevention, Restoration and Equity – **Projects in UK and Australia on therapeutic gardening**The book has chapters from Australia, Canada, New Zealand, the Netherlands, Ireland and the United Kingdom (UK). The editors are medical geographers from Australia and Canada. The book was supported with grants from the Australian Government. Chapters discuss differing outcomes in public and therapeutic gardening. It is on sale as an ebook and in hardback on the website. - www.routledge.com/9781032409924

Mental health outcomes associated with gardening were reviewed over a ten-year period in Australia. Both structured gardening programmes and unstructured gardening have mainly positive results. Gardening in community settings was found to be more beneficial than gardening in domestic settings, possibly due to more social interaction. Gardening can lead to an enhanced sense of community,

life satisfaction and quality, with a reduction of depression and anxiety across a range of age groups and populations. Better methods are needed to measure benefits more closely.

The green social prescribing (GSP) of work in groups in gardens and green areas by UK is discussed. Public greenspace allows exposure to nature in cities like Manchester where the projects were based. These were hosted by voluntary groups at neighbourhood levels. Would they be sustainable to address chronic illness in the long term and reduce health inequalities? As there is little research evidence

for their effectiveness, funding from the health budget is difficult. An RHS led project showed that structured gardening can have an impact allowing people space to recover, think and connect.

Gardening for neuro-disability clients - a system for gardening

A horticulturist in London developed a system to help design suitable gardens for hands-on therapeutic gardening and garden related activities. The system is the site, the people, the plants, tools and infrastructure (soil and water).

The chapter includes practical tips and lists a range of gardening related activities such as ceramics and cooking. It highlights the participation of this neuro-disabled group in the London in Bloom Its Your neighbourhood competition which led to recognition of their achievements. The award connected them to the wider gardening community in London as well as motivating them to do more gardening. Special awards are now available in South West in Bloom for groups of gardeners with disabilities.

Gardens in long term health care settings

The benefits of therapeutic gardens in Australian long term health care settings seeks to mitigate loneliness, social isolation and depression. Wellbeing may be gained by appreciating the beauty of the garden and socialising outside. Research indicates that active care of plants brings additional benefits. The provision of gardens and simple gardening activities need to be embedded into care. Staff need to be aware of the benefits in quality of life of gardens to clients.

Poltimore In Bloom

Inspired by the previous year's Jubilee village celebrations, on Saturday 4th February 2023 Poltimore in Bloom was officially launched.



Unbeknownst to us at the time, there were only 164 days until our community efforts would be judged which, as it turned out, would be with remarkable success!

This is our story so far:

Poltimore is a small, beautiful, and peaceful village just north of Exeter with some 120 households and a historic church, but there is a lack of public space and what there is had been unloved in recent times. There are no schools, pubs, or parks, just a small village farm-shop, our village hall and a bus to Exeter once a week.



A team was formed from our eager volunteers and ten areas requiring some Bloom attention were identified.

February saw planting design undertaken to ensure all year-round interest, schemes contained a good mix of plants to attract pollinators and others to reduce the need for annual bedding. During the weekend of 1st April, the bulk of our shrub and perennial planting was completed, just in time for the end of the planting season!

Away from site works, other important activities included the creation of our website and social media plus plenty of fundraising.

Together with generous donations from local organizations and businesses, villagers supported fund raising initiatives including craft making sessions, bingo at the village hall and selling loads of logs from a donated ancient fallen Oak tree. £3,800 was raised in those few short weeks, £2,500 was spent, leaving us on a firm footing to launch Bloom into 2024.



The biggest donation of all came from villagers' time – well over 600 hours of litter picking, digging, building, painting, planting, watering... the list goes on but most importantly being able to come together for a common cause.

As the spring turned to summer our works continued to enhance the chosen areas. The addition of an art mural to our bus stop transformed a dreary spot, rainwater catchment tanks, planters, steppingstones and benches made from the Oak tree created visual improvements and much needed seating.

During June, slugs caused significant damage to our wildflower areas, so we decided to create 'replacement flowers' and following a community request villagers of all ages created an amazing array of recycled bottle flowers.

These made a wonderful impact and added a fabulous finishing touch to our Church garden.

OLTIMORE





Our wild areas were enhanced with bug hotels, Bird boxes and wildlife ponds. Grass areas were left to grow. A survey in July noted a significant increase in insect life to that noted previously in the barren mown areas.



So came the culmination of our efforts!

In mid-July we welcomed Lesley and John to Poltimore for our judging visit, thankfully the weather was on our side, and it really did feel like a very special day to show off our first attempt at Bloom. So many supporters turned up to enjoy the occasion and the fruits of our efforts.

Without doubt the biggest benefit of the competition has been to the residents that live in the village, not only the physical improvement to our outside shared

spaces but the sense of bonding and pride in the bloom adventure that has united so many of us.. The only downside is that it now takes three times as long to do the 'local lanes walk' as invariably you will meet someone....!

So how did we do? It was a long wait until October to find out!

Ten villagers attended the presentation event in Truro and we were stunned to be awarded: **Gold Medal** and overall Winner of the Pennant Village Devon Category, Vic Verrier Trophy for 'Best Newcomer'.

Barry Cruse Trophy for 'Best Website'.and Outstanding – Level 5 for It's Your Neighbourhood Entry 'Friends of Poltimore'.

We're now well underway with this year's activities to improve the current planting and give some new areas the Poltimore in Bloom treatment.

We hope you enjoyed the insight into our adventure to date and we'd like to share this note that was sent by one of our residents that we think sums up why we all continue to be inspired to do what we do.

"The village looks beautiful and my walks to the postbox have been exceptionally slow and meandering as I enjoy the improvements you've all made. What a lovely gift to the villagers and our visitors. Thank you to you all "
